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REPORT OF THE DIVISIONAL FORUM REPRESENTATIVE Jim Adaskaveg

The Pacific Division ratified constitutional changes this summer in Honolulu which agreed with the ratified constitutional changes of APS, mainly the re-organization of council membership and the establishment of a new hierarchy of committees, boards, and forums including the Divisional Forum (DF). Thus, former councilors of the divisions became Divisional Forum Representatives (DFR) and one DF member, the Divisional Forum Councilor (DFC), sits on APS council. Some divisional members at the divisional business meeting criticized the new structure because the DFC was appointed by the forum and not elected directly to council, but the fact remains that all forum representatives are elected officials from each of the six divisions of APS. Councilors-at-large are also directly elected and sit on council. Furthermore, the inaugural DF is a highly functional office with very strategic responsibilities. One DF member is automatically on the Membership Committee (currently W. Elmer) and another member is on the Nominating committee (currently J. Rupe) of APS.



A major responsibility of the DF is to develop engagement plans for the divisions' membership. Thus, there is and will be clear and direct communication to APS Council about any concern or new idea from any member of the division or society through the DF or Councilors-at-Large.

In the first meeting after the annual APS meeting, the DF met in conjunction with the Northeast Division annual meeting in New Brunswick, NJ, on October 12-14, 2011. Council-approved, divisional engagement plans were discussed as goals that the divisions will address to improve awareness and initiate recruitment of students into the discipline of plant pathology and ultimately into APS. The divisional engagement plans are to target programs in Education and Extension by: (1) increasing exposure of APS Divisions to high school students and teachers; (2) attracting promising undergraduate college students into the field of plant pathology; and (3) increasing awareness of members and students about private and public sectors of extension. For example, the North-Central division has focused on "Plan No. 1" by already approving a half-day, "Plant Pathology in Focus" session for high school students and undergraduates at their next divisional meeting at the Ohio State University in June 2012 to increase awareness of careers in plant pathology.

Another goal of the Divisional Forum was to participate in the annual Extension "Round-Table" discussions of the Northeastern Division. Major disease outbreaks over the last year were discussed for each state in the division. Not all the divisions have such a program and thus, the Divisional Forum participated to encourage other divisions to develop extension and outreach awareness amongst membership and possibly public sectors. Currently, the Pacific Division is also planning similar activities in both undergraduate recruitment and extension awareness at the next divisional meeting in Sacramento, CA, in 2012.

An annual APS Graduate Student Symposium proposal is also being developed by the Divisional Forum. This proposal aims to have the winners of the divisional student paper competitions participate in a symposium at the annual APS meeting. Monetary travel awards are planned to be established through the divisions. The objective is to showcase award-winning graduate students at the national level and to assist them in launching their careers. Discussions of permanent funding for this symposium are underway. Additionally, a discussion of the need for peer-review of meeting abstracts ensued. Several options are being considered to improve the quality of abstracts for future divisional and national meetings.

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FROM THE DIVISIONAL FORUM- Co-Sponsoring a special session

Dear Division:

The **Divisional Forum** (DF) would like to co-sponsor a special session for the annual meetings for the Graduate Students with **Early Career Professionals Committee** and the **Graduate Student Committee**. This will be a **recurring** special session designed to showcase the top graduate students (M.S. or Ph.D.) from each of the six APS Division meetings. The chosen speakers will give a presentation of their research that won them top honors at their respective division meetings. Speakers will be allowed 20 minutes for their presentations, and this includes time for questions. This annual symposium will highlight some of the top students in the field of plant pathology and broaden the engagement and visibility of APS Divisions. We propose the following information and agenda for your division to consider.

The students will be selected for this honor at each of the divisional meetings. Each Divisional Forum Representative (there are six representatives, one for each division) will provide the name of ONE graduate student who will be selected to present as part of the annual symposium. Student presenters must be current members of APS. The name and the abstract of the student will need to be selected <u>BEFORE</u> the annual meeting submission deadline for abstracts (generally March 15 of the year of the meeting). Divisional meetings that take place AFTER the March 15 deadline (e.g., the North Central and the Pacific Divisions) will need to provide the names of students from the PRIOR year.

The DF is **requesting sponsorship** from each Division to fund the top students. Each division is being asked to be responsible for providing the funding necessary for their selected student. The division may choose to use funds from their current travel awards, graduate student awards, and/or create special funding. One possibility may be to provide only partial funding and request the remainder from the student's major professor and/or the department. Constitutional and/or by laws changes may be required.

The DF encourages each Division to act on this request so that a student can be selected and funded to attend the Graduate Student Award Symposium at the **2013 annual APS meeting in Austin, TX. Session Organizer(s) - Divisional Forum Representatives:**

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

First announcement of the XVIIth Biennial Workshop on the Smuts and Bunts to be held inShenzhen, Guangdong, China from July 9-13, 2012

The smuts and bunts are important factors in reducing yield and quality losses in cereals and other important food, forage and fibre crops. Researchers working on the Smuts and Bunts have met biennially since 1976 in the United States, Canada, Mexico, and Europe, to discuss important scientific and regulatory issues regarding smuts and bunts. During July 9-13, 2012, we will be hosting the XVIIth Biennial Workshop on the Smuts and Bunts in Shenzhen, Guangdong, China.

The aim of this workshop is to promote scientific exchange, enhance research capacity and cooperation on smuts and bunts around the world, and discuss regulatory issues. The workshop will focus on biology, genetics, classification, risk analysis, technology of identification and detection, quarantine treatment and management. The new research progress about smuts and bunts will be discussed. This international workshop will provide a platform for exchange and sharing of knowledge, experience and research findings on smuts and bunts.

The cost of registration before June 15 is ¥2600.00 (RMB). After June 15, registration is ¥2800.00 (RMB). Registration includes the opening reception, breakfasts, lunches and dinners (July 10-13), a banquet, and the 1-day tour of Shenzhen. The workshop will be held at the Silver Lake Resort Hotel, Shenzhen. A block of rooms will be held until July 9 and the room rates are about ¥500 - ¥1000 (RMB) per night based on availability and room size. Registration for accompanying person not attending the scientific program (includes breakfasts, lunches and dinners (July 10-13), a banquet, and the 1-day tour of Shenzhen OCT East Park) is ¥2000.00 (RMB).

The DF is also developing recommendations to council to address concerns about meeting schedules when the annual APS meeting is held in the same geographical area of a specific division. Unfortunately, not all divisional constitutions are the same. Some indicate that they have a separate meeting at a different time (e.g., NC Division); while others forego a divisional meeting but retain the business meeting and incorporate papers into the national meeting itinerary (e.g., Pacific Division). Logistical problems have occurred with the latter situation with different calendar deadlines and concerns over student paper competitions at the divisional level occurring over the course of the meeting. Obviously, there are many pros and cons to any proposed solution but the DF is discussing many possible scenarios.

Lastly, APS Council has communicated with the DF through DFC David Schmale in an eight "Focus Topic Outline" in an effort to constantly improve the function of APS for its membership –

1) Maintain and improve efficient communication between council and leadership segments of APS.

2) Maintain the strong financial health of APS through conventional (e.g., its journals) and new innovative sources.

3) Develop new financial investments – report of the CIE (Committee on Innovation and Entrepreneurship) on new revenue streams.

4) Demonstrate the value of APS membership to current and future members – meetings, publications, resources.

New Hires.Travel/Misc. Postdoctoral Scholar Position Available

DESCRIPTION OF DUTIES: The emphasis of this position will be to develop methods to reduce aflatoxin contamination of tree nuts (**mainly almonds**). The primary causal agents of aflatoxin contamination in tree nuts in California are *Aspergillus flavus* and *A. parasiticus*, fungi with no known sexual phase. *Aspergillus flavus/parasiticus* are very infrequent fungi, but because the tolerance of aflatoxins in tree nuts is very low (5 to 15 parts per billion), aflatoxin contamination problems have become very serious in the last decade or so. The sources of contamination will use traditional and modern molecular approaches to increase our knowledge of the risk factors and spatial patterns of aflatoxin contamination in almonds. At the same time, the candidate will participate in experiments to develop data on the displacement of *A. flavus/parasiticus* in an experimental almond orchard by using the biocontrol *A. flavus* AF36 that has been registered in cottonseed and corn. The ultimate goal of this position will be to understand the population diversity of aflatoxigenic fungi, sources, and conditions affecting infection of almonds, and biological control using the atoxigenic strain AF36 and other atoxigenic *A. flavus* strains through research efforts. The results will be used by the Almond Board of California to get registration of AF36 on almonds following the expected registration in pistachio.

This is a University of California postdoctoral position for which a Ph.D. earned within the last 4 years is preferred. This position is available immediately.

QUALIFICATION REQUIREMENTS: Recent Ph.D. in Plant Pathology or related Biological/ Microbiological Science is required. Knowledge and experience with the filamentous fungi and/or utilizing molecular techniques in microbial ecology would be useful.

LOCATION: The position will be with the Department of Plant Pathology, University of California, Davis, but will be located at the Kearney Agricultural Center. This is the largest, off-campus Agricultural Research and Extension Center owned by the University. The Center is located about 2.5 hours away from the main campus.
